# A message from our CEO

Dear colleagues and supporters,

Welcome to NCA's 2024 Annual Report. It's not only a story of 2024 but one of our future work as well. So, while all the financials, data, and other information you find in these pages comes from the Children's Advocacy Center (CAC) movement's progress in 2024, the stories we tell about their work and ours lead in a continuous thread to the future.

As one example: a decade of fighting for stable Victims of Crime Act (VOCA) funding on which CACs and kids depend culminated in a year-long push in 2024 to stabilize the Crime Victims Fund (CVF) that resources VOCA grants. That effort may have fallen just short at the end of the last Congress. But, with thousands of calls and emails to members of Congress around the country, House and Senate offices have heard our unified voice. As we have just entered the 119th Congress, H.R. 909, the Crime Victims Stabilization Act (CVFSA) 2.0, is our opportunity to get this important work over the finish line. (More on that on p. 6).

Of course, CACs are already hurting around the country. Even with the passage of CVFSA 2.0, the battle for healing and justice for children is not over. We are prepared for the long haul: pass CVFSA, then pass whatever comes after CVFSA. In partnership with CACs, Chapters, national partners and supporters, NCA is leading the charge in Washington for a more sustainable future for the CAC movement and therefore a more sustainable set of services for the children and families that need us.

An eye on the future is critical for all the work we do at NCA and at CACs across America. Read on as we highlight our efforts to serve rural CACs, comprising nearly half of our members and the backbone of our movement with their innovative and resourceful practices (p. 10). We'll share the critical work of our NCA Institute for Better Mental Health Outcomes (p. 8), our learning

institution on a mission to increase evidence-based treatment and end child therapy waitlists at CACs. And, we'll update you on the more than 500 CACs now serving military families (p. 4).

It's hard to look back on a single year of work when you're as excited about the future as we are. So, please take a moment to pause to look at just a few of the accomplishments we achieved together in 2024 and the plans we have for 2025 and beyond. Together, we are changing children's lives.

# Access for all: Expanding CACs to serve military families



**THERE ARE NEARLY 1.6 MILLION MILITARY CONNECTED CHILDREN** in our country with unique needs because of their parents' military service. For these families, a range of military-specific programs may become involved when abuse is suspected. Military connected children deserve the same gold-standard care their civilian counterparts are getting down the street.

When NCA began an initiative to strengthen CAC-military partnerships in 2018, just 7% of CACs reporting military installations in the communities had formal agreements with military installations, making collaboration difficult and military family access to CACs inconsistent.

In 2024, NCA finalized the most recent of seven memoranda of understanding (MOUs) with Military Criminal Investigative Organizations (MCIOs) and Department of Defense Family Advocacy Programs (FAPs) to formalize partnerships at the national level and support CAC-military partnerships nationwide.

Today, that number has reached over 60% of Accredited CACs with formal agreements enabling them to serve military children and families across the country. NCA is working to expand that number even further, to ensure that all military connected children have access to the services of CACs, and that those services are well-coordinated with the Department of Defense programs that are designed to address their unique needs.


"The formalization of these MOUs affirms that the specialized services offered by CACs are accessible to military families, to nearly 200 military installations nationwide," said Dr. Lolita Allen, Military Community Advocacy Director.

These agreements eliminate the burden of navigating the challenges of individual contracts for CACs and their partners at military installations. Instead, CACs can sign on to participate in these national MOUs, providing a clear understanding of what it takes and what is required to go all in as partners to ensure that our military-connected children receive the care that they deserve.

"This partnership allows us to deliver a more compassionate and traumainformed response to victims, while also tapping into the specialized knowledge and resources of CACs to refine our policing strategies and drive better outcomes for children and families," said Special Agent Matthew Haywood, an Army criminal investigator that works on child abuse cases.

# A second act: The Crime Victims Fund Stabilization Act 2.0

WITH NATIONAL CHILDREN'S ALLIANCE (NCA) leading the advocacy effort from here in Washington, more than 200 members of Congress co-sponsored legislation to stabilize and pass the Crime Victims Fund Stabilization Act (CVFSA). Thousands of calls and emails from Children's Advocacy Centers (CACs) and their supporters around the country made an incredible difference in highlighting the urgency of funding for these centers that serve kids and families through some of their hardest moments.

Yet, after a year of full-court press on the local, state, and national level—and a companion bill with bipartisan support in the Senate—the CVFSA was never brought up for a vote on the House floor.

"Policymaking is not a one and done deal," observed NCA Director of Government Affairs Denise Edwards. "Movements aren't made in a single year. Sometimes they aren't made in a single Congress."

Yet NCA CEO Teresa Huizar explains, the longer relationships and deeper common understanding with lawmakers, built and strengthened over the course of this push to pass the CVFSA, will result in something beyond just passing a single bill.

"The very process of making these connections is an act of building a new, durable network of partnerships with members of Congress," Huizar said. "We are here educating lawmakers on the work of CACs and telling them what the kids we serve need. But we are not just seeking votes. We are seeking our champions."

Across the country, advocates found that after a year of sustained advocacy contact with their House and Senate offices, advocacy became simply part of the CAC role.

"Kansas Senator Jerry Moran was a key player for us," said Child Advocacy Centers of Kansas Executive Director Kasey Dalke. "At times, I was nervous making such a bold ask consistently without a clear yes or no, but I knew we couldn't afford to stop pushing, too much was on the line. My motto? Bold moves require bold courage."

But in the U.S. House, the bill caught like wildfire. That owes largely to efforts by the CAC movement's champion in Congress, Ann Wagner. Wagner is a longtime Republican Congresswoman from Missouri serving the Second District outside St. Louis. She has emerged as the CAC movement's foremost proponent in Congress, having authored the CVFSA and lobbied her colleagues to co-sponsor and vote for it to become law.

"It's really become my aim in Congress, after representing my constituents, to see CACs get the resources they need and that children deserve in this country," explained Wagner. "Every member of Congress has an issue that's near and dear to their heart. For me, it's CACs. As I tell the CAC story to other House members and watch them become diehards for this work, too, I have no doubt the CVFSA is only the beginning."

Wagner introduced H.R. 909 in the new Congress as soon as she could. She considers the 182 returning representatives who signed last time as the "floor" for support, but she believes this bill will continue to gain momentum with even more cosponsors than last year's 211 that will ultimately get it across the finish line in this Congress.

The fight isn't over yet. With the help of funders, CAC members, advocates, and our champions in Congress, we can get H.R. 909 passed and continue to help kids heal.



# The NCA Institute: Training to treat trauma

#### THE NCA INSTITUTE FOR BETTER MENTAL HEALTH OUTCOMES

provides high-quality training in evidence-based treatments to mental health professionals, executive directors, and victim advocates working with children across the nation. This past year, the Institute



trained **2,157** professionals addressing child abuse, **945** of whom are accounted for in the trainings listed on this page. Another **1,212** were trained through our annual mental health conference Seamless, ongoing webinar series, state trainings, and more. Below are some of the trainings that we offer and words from the trainees who felt their time with the Institute was worthwhile. 

#### Trauma-Focused Cognitive Behavioral Therapy — 490 people trained

TF-CBT is the gold-standard treatment for children and families addressing abuse.

"One of my patients began therapy with me adamant that healing was not possible for them. Within a few months of treatment, they stated proudly 'You know, maybe healing is possible for me.'"







### Alternatives for Families: A Cognitive Behavioral Therapy — 54 people trained

AF-CBT is a treatment designed to improve relationships in cases of physical abuse or aggression, family conflicts, or behavior problems. "As a new therapist, I was nervous about providing effective therapeutic services and needed additional support. One word I would use to describe the training I received is 'equipped.' My competence as a therapist has increased and my work with children and families has improved because of the quality training I received from NCA."

Advanced Trauma-Focused Cognitive Behavioral Therapy for Problematic Sexual Behaviors — 20 people trained in-person



As many as 25% of cases that come through a CAC involve another youth with problematic sexual behaviors (PSBs), many experiencing trauma symptoms themselves.

"The training allowed me to develop confidence in treating an extremely high-need population of kids. Not only were we taught how to implement this treatment, but Ashley and Geoff explained the science and reasoning behind every intervention tool and assessment element—we understand the why behind every part of the modality."

#### Child and Family Traumatic Stress Intervention — 171 people trained

CFTSI is a brief evidencebased treatment that can help lower the stressful symptoms children experience after a traumatic event in 5-8 sessions. "CFTSI has allowed us to see clients quicker and in a more structured way by providing a clear and concise focus on trauma symptoms and how trauma has impacted the family. It's also allowed us to keep parents and caregivers more engaged in treatment."

## Enhance Early Engagement (E3): Engaging Families in Mental Health Treatment to Support Healing and Thriving — 101 people trained

In this program, victim advocates build the understanding of trauma responses, screenings, and other evidence-based engagement skills that is critical to overcoming barriers to recovery for families and kids. "The E3 training improved our work by helping us to make a "reason" or evidence-based decision on mental health referrals. This also will be a building block to making best use of the limited resources we have for mental health support."

### **Evidence-Based Assessments** — 71 people trained

Standardized assessments allow for practitioners to consistently assess all factors contributing to a child's trauma, track progress, and help kids and families see the change.

"I learned to use the assessments as tools instead of the sole reason for diagnosis and justification for treatment. An interesting thing I learn is that while we focus on the importance of the items our clients score high, it's just as important to pay attention to items ones scored low as they can provide information that is just as valuable to the overall clinical presentation."

#### **Executive Director Mental Health Academy** — 38 people trained

Many CAC executive directors don't have a background in mental health and need to know the basics to effectively manage clinical services. "Even though I have been in the CAC world for quite some time, I am not a clinician and wanted to have a better understanding and the language to better guide our clinicians. I am responsible for implementing the mental health treatment services for both our internal clinicians and our contractual clinicians and I felt that I needed to have a better foundation on which to speak about the 'why' of our programming and the research that backs it."

# Setting the stage

## #BeThereNow introduces America to CACs through the bright side of parenting

# THROUGH CAMPAIGNS LIKE #ITSYOURBUSINESS AND STATEWIDE CAMPAIGNS LIKE #SHINE, National Children's

Alliance has shared with tens of millions of Americans effective messages on the personal responsibility adults bear to stop child abuse. In fact, market research finds that since 2019, awareness of both Children's Advocacy Centers (CACs) and NCA grew by 24 percentage points—nearly a quarter of Americans learned about us in that span. That means that after years of posting, advertising, sharing, and building our online community around prevention, two out of three Americans now know us by name.

CACs themselves across the country already have a huge reach within their communities. Our members who track their campaign impressions reached more than 90 million people with messages of prevention and hope for healing after abuse. Add this to the more than 60 million impressions NCA achieved last year on our own, and it's a powerful, national foundation for what comes next.

The next challenge, among all these newfound audiences, is to educate them on what the work of CACs looks like. While two-thirds of Americans recognize NCA, only about half of those polled are familiar with the complex, trauma-informed work we support nationwide.





To gain traction and help engage tens of millions of potential supporters, the next messaging pivot is to show parents and other caregivers the primary role they play in a child's mental health, and the caring community at the CAC that is waiting to support them and their child if they ever need it.

In other words, all we have to do is #BeThereNow.

#BeThereNow is a new NCA campaign that aims to educate and equip parents to know when their child is going through more than just a mood. Where #ItsYourBusiness features serious scenarios requiring vigilance and courage, #BeThereNow shows children and their parents building strong relationships leading up to the moment when they need mom or dad most.

#BeThereNow reached 6.1 million on Instagram the day it was launched, World Mental Health Day, October 10, 2024, and shows no signs of slowing. Images show grandfamilies hard at work baking with their grandchildren, or a father and son sharing music. Whether it's helping a daughter learn to ride a bike, teaching a son to cook, or dancing silly to make them smile, caregivers that spend time with their kids in trust-building moments will be ready for the day when the child really needs their help.

It's based on the market research that showed our caregiver audiences respond to warm, positive, emotional scenarios, and are most interested in the role CACs play in kids' safety compared to other help we provide.

"#BeThereNow is also based on scientific research that shows a child's single greatest factor in recovering from abuse is a strong, supportive caregiver who believes them," said Blake Warenik, NCA's communications lead and creator of the campaign. "Parents want to imagine their child on their best day and not their worst. This starts the conversation with caregivers that they really do have the power to do something whenever their child needs them, and that their local CAC may be able to help."

# What connects rural CACs in the U.S.?

america's rural and frontier areas defy simple categorization or stereotyping. From Alaska Native villages to fishing communities in the Florida Everglades, rural America holds millions of square miles of diverse landscapes and people, with unique languages, cultures, economies, and ways of life. Hundreds of National Children's Alliance (NCA) member Children's Advocacy Centers (CACs) are located in these areas or serve people who live there.

If rural CACs are so hard to define, what do they have in common? One commonality all rural and frontier communities share is they all have to stretch the resources they have, lean into their creativity, and create solutions that work for their area.

"This sense of creativity is something we think can be shared among rural communities but also something that all CACs may also benefit from," mused Vanessa Stergios, NCA's Senior Program Associate leading rural projects.

NCA's Rural CAC Convening in October 2024 tested that theory, gathering more than 100 rural CAC professionals from 37 states in Bozeman, Montana, to share common challenges and strategies to overcome them. Rural CACs have commonly reported being understaffed, with professionals serving in multiple roles and with limited resources.

"While there was a lot of diversity in the challenges that CACs across the United States face, there were also a lot of commonalities," said Green County (Wisc.) Human Services Child Advocacy Center Coordinator Stephanie King, MSW. "Ultimately, the kids we serve deserve the best - regardless of their geographic location."

As a continuation of the conversation, NCA launched the Rural Resources Hub in NCA Engage in January 2025 and the Rural CAC Collaborative Work Group in February 2025, to involve leadership from this group in identifying challenges and creating solutions that benefit the CAC movement.

**Leadership and Workforce Development.** NCA values growing a strong and innovative workforce. By partnering, collaborating, and convening, NCA provides education and training opportunities to nurture a best-in-class workforce that strives to reflect the children and families it serves.
